# **Course Description:**

This course, "Understanding Social Behavior" is designed to present a general introduction to social psychology for university students from various departments as an elective course. Students will be introduced to history, general theories, and methods of social psychology; as well basic concepts and recent research findings. The format of the course will include mostly lectures and discussions; videos or in-class activities will also be incorporated depending on our schedule.

## **Course Objectives**

- To increase the awareness of and knowledge in what the science of social psychology is, what social psychology refers to and what it deals with.
- To provide students with a general overview about social psychology and have students relate the topics and theories to social issues or their area of study.

**Exams:** You will have 3 midterm exams and a final exam. Exams will be multiple-choice format. I will provide you with example questions before the first exam. Out of the 3 midterm exams, the lowest mark will be dropped. However, if you miss a test, there are no make-ups; hence the extra exam becomes your make-up (i.e., you lose your chance to drop the lowest).

Make up policy: There are <u>no</u> make-up exams for the midterm examinations. In order to be eligible to take a make-up for your final, you should have a <u>documented and officially acceptable excuse</u>. If you are eligible, you <u>must</u> report to your course instructor <u>within 3 days</u> after the final. The make-up will include all the topics and it will be essay / short answer type questions (i.e., not multiple choice).

**Attendance**: I do take attendance and it counts towards 10% of your grade. You need to have attended to at least 70% of the courses <u>in order to be eligible</u> to take the final examination. Otherwise you will not be able to take the final exam and receive a NA for the

course –which, incidentally, will prevent you from taking the resit make-up exam. (The other condition for a NA is failure to attend the midterms and the final.)
