INTRODUCTION

- Do I have an effective attention getting technique? (Use your creativity, make it interesting!)
- Is it well linked to my presentation? (Do I have a bridging sentence that ties it to my topic?)
- Do I use my attention getting technique before introducing my topic?
- Do I greet my audience? (a warm welcome is always a good start!)
- Do I introduce myself?
- Do I introduce my topic? (And am I enthusiastic about it?)
- Do I have an overview?
- · Have I specifically written down my topic and parts of the body in my overview?
- Do I need to give background information? If yes, is it briefly covered in the intro right after the overview before you start the body part?

ORGANIZATION

- Do I use clear and strong signposts? (refer to your book to see examples)
- Are the ideas in logical order?
- Do I have only one focus point? (don't use advantages & disadvantages together OR effects and types, for example)
- Do I have a manageable number of subtopics? (avoid listing of many items; make sure you have 2 or 3 subtopics which you explain thoroughly)
- Have I shown my outline to my instructor? (highly recommended)
- Is the duration of my presentation within the time limit?

CONTENT

- Do I present rich content? (reminder: only mentioning the sources does not mean you explain your subtopics)
- Do I use examples, statistical info, analogies, explanations or comparisons to explain information? What type of supporting techniques would my audience need to better comprehend the points I make?
- · Have I used a variety of sources?
- Do I orally cite 3 sources in the body part of my presentation?
- Are my sources reliable?
- Do I mention the surnames, dates or other important reference information clearly?
- Have I used a variety of oral citation structures? (refer to your book to see examples)

DELIVERY

- Do I look willing to present the information?
- Do I have a loud enough voice that can easily be heard?
- Do I have the desire to give an effective presentation? (this is you final presentation, put a show on the stage!)
- Have I practiced enough to achieve fluency?
- Do I move too much? Don't!
- Do I look confident?
- Do I avoid turning my back to the audience?
- Do I integrate my slides into my presentation well? (by pointing at them, by signposting..etc.)

LANGUAGE

- Have I checked the pronunciation of the words that I am not familiar with?
- Do I use correct structures and diverse vocabulary?
- Is my speech in spoken discourse? (signposts / sources simplified in your own words/ interactive language / asking questions when explaining things)
- Do I use quick summaries after complicated information?
- Do I elaborate on my charts / graphs / pictures? (Remember the 3 stages: introduce, explain, draw conclusions)
- · Do I avoid reading the slides?

VISUALS

- Do I have enough number of visuals?
- Are they effective in terms of design?
- Are they visible? (Font size: 24-26 / color)
- · Have I checked the spelling / grammar of my slides?
- Do my slides include reference information in APA style? E.g. (Jones, 2011, p.5)
- Do I have sentences, long paragraphs on my slides? Don't!
- Are my slides visually supported? (pictures / clear tables / flow chats)?
- Are my slides consistent with one another? (the way you list info / the fonts / the size / the style)
- Do I use parallel structures in my bullet points? (all noun phrases or gerunds; for example)
- Is my end-text reference list in APA format? (alphabetical order, italics..etc.)

CONCLUSION

- Do I use a concluding remark to signal my conclusion?
- Do I summarize the parts of my presentation?
- Do I give a memorable message to create impact in my conclusion?
- Do I show my references?
- Do I thank my audience and invite questions?
